

Cameroon 2009 Orphanage Renovation

Dates: Flexible – teams can discuss potential dates with LHM but best months to travel to Cameroon are November - February. Optimal timeframe is 10 days in country, excluding travel days.

Individual Budget: Approx \$650 – This includes food, lodging, in-country transportation, translators, visa, and travel/health insurance. This is an estimated cost and does not include international flights and is based on a team of 10 people for 11/12 days.

Materials for Project: \$5,000. This includes materials for all projects and required tools. The whole volunteer team should provide these costs.



Orphanage—Feeding, VBS, and Library Project

A team is needed to help build and equip a library with shelving, books, DVDs, videos and drawing materials, as well as hold a 3-day Vacation Bible School (VBS) for the children in the orphanage.

Since 2003 LHM-Cameroon has been responsible for the spiritual education of the children in the 'Unique Du Cameroun' orphanage in Yaoundé. LHM-Cameroon ministry center staff and volunteers would like to partner with a team of volunteers in further touching the lives of the children they are ministering by providing funds to help feed some of the children for one month, and building a new library in the orphanage. In addition, the team will share with the children through a three-day Vacation Bible School (VBS).

It is important that there is at least one person skilled in carpentry on this team.



Project Location

The team will be based in Yaoundé the capital city of Cameroon and will travel to the orphanage each day, which is on the outskirts of the capital city. Yaoundé was founded in 1888 by German traders as a base for the ivory trade and an agricultural research station. After Germany's defeat in WWI, France became the colonial power in eastern Cameroon, and Yaoundé became the capital of French Cameroon. It has continued as the capital of the Republic of Cameroon until the present day and it boasts some unusual and modern architecture and has a considerably cooler climate than other hotter places in the area.

Entry/Exit Requirements

A tourist visa is required and your team is responsible for applying for the visa.

Documents required

- U.S. Passport must be valid 6 months beyond intended stay
- Tickets and Documents for return or onward travel
- International Certificate of Vaccination for Yellow Fever required
- 2 Visa Application Forms, fully completed and signed
- 2 Passport-type photographs required
- Copy of recent bank statement or letter from bank verifying applicant has sufficient funds.
- Embassy fee for tourist visa - \$100

Airport departure – check with your flight agency whether departure tax is included in your ticket as there is a departure tax of approximately \$23 levied in local currency.

REGISTRATION/EMBASSY LOCATION: Americans traveling in Cameroon are encouraged to register with the U.S. Embassy through the State Department's travel registration website so that they can obtain updated information on travel and security within Cameroon.

Vaccinations

Vaccination or Disease	Recommendations or Requirements for Vaccine-Preventable Diseases
<u>Routine</u>	Recommended if you are not up-to-date with routine shots such as, measles/mumps/rubella (MMR) vaccine, diphtheria/pertussis/tetanus (DPT) vaccine, poliovirus vaccine, etc.
<u>Yellow Fever</u>	Yellow fever vaccination requirement for travelers to Cameroon: Required upon arrival from all countries if traveler is >1 year of age CDC recommendation: For all travelers >9 months of age Vaccination should be given 10 days before travel and at 10 year intervals if there is on-going risk.
<u>Hepatitis A</u> or immune globulin (IG)	Recommended for all unvaccinated people traveling to or working in countries with an intermediate or high level of hepatitis A virus infection where exposure might occur through food or water. Cases of travel-related hepatitis A can also occur in travelers to developing countries with "standard" tourist itineraries, accommodations, and food consumption behaviors.
<u>Hepatitis B</u>	Recommended for all unvaccinated persons traveling to or working in countries with intermediate to high levels of endemic HBV transmission, especially those who might be exposed to blood or body fluids, have sexual contact with the local population, or be exposed through medical treatment (e.g., for an accident).
<u>Typhoid</u>	Sometimes recommended for all unvaccinated people traveling to or working in Central Africa, especially if visiting smaller cities, villages, or rural areas and staying with friends or relatives where exposure might occur through food or water.
<u>Polio</u>	Recommended for adult travelers who have received a primary series with either inactivated poliovirus vaccine (IPV) or oral polio vaccine (OPV). They should receive another dose of IPV before departure. For adults, available data do not indicate the need for more than a single lifetime booster dose with IPV.

Drugs to Prevent Malaria (Antimalarial drugs)

If you will be visiting a malaria risk area in Cameroon, you will need to take one of the following antimalarial drugs: [atovaquone/proguanil](#), [doxycycline](#), or [mefloquine](#) ([primaquine](#) in special circumstances and only after G6PD testing).

Note: Chloroquine is NOT an effective antimalarial drug in Cameroon and should not be taken to prevent malaria in this region.

Lodging & Meals

The team will be staying at a mid range hotel in Yaoundé and will also eat most of your meals at the hotel. There will be an opportunity to visit local restaurants.

Sightseeing

The team will be offered a choice of sightseeing during orientation in Yaoundé. If the team would like to visit Waza National Park please let us know and we can make arrangements for this (cost is extra).

Budget

Costs for Global Work & Witness teams are split into 'Individual Costs', which is your food, lodging, transportation, etc., and your 'Project Costs', which is the cost of the materials for the actual project you participate on. Whether it is a VBS or a construction project we ask that your team cover these costs as a group.

Sample budget of **Individual Costs** based on 10 people traveling 11/12 days:

Insurance	14 days @ \$2.75	\$38.50
Lodging	11 nights @ \$25 (double occupancy)	\$275.00
Meals	11 days @ \$15	\$165.00
Bottled Water	Approx \$5 per day	\$60.00
Transportation	Incl. Gas and driver	\$100.00
Total		\$638.50

You must also budget for your international flights, entry visas, bottled water (), sightseeing, souvenirs and departure taxes.

The budget is estimated and your team may choose to eat a little more expensive or a little cheaper meals, which would obviously affect your budget. We tend to try and over budget as much as possible so you do not run short of funds but it never hurts to have some extra funds available. It would also be wise to carry a small amount of additional contingency funds for any medical emergencies that may occur or unexpected costs.

Project Costs for this project is \$5,000 – this covers wood, tools, and items to stock the library and food for one month for the children at the orphanage.

Insurance Coverage

Medical evacuation for all team members is mandatory and LHM provide insurance from AIG at the cost of \$2.75 a day. We will provide you with an insurance card with a policy number on it and a contact number in cases of extreme emergency – i.e. something that requires evacuation. The person you talk with will advise you on what to do in those circumstances. For all other claims please pay any bills that you incur and make a claim directly to the insurance company when you return.

LHM Ministry Center

There is freedom of religion in Cameroon, but radio broadcasts and television airings are limited. Therefore, the most effective method of ministry in Cameroon is a personalized one-on-one approach, which brings staff and volunteers to the front doors of those to whom they are reaching out. Though this method is hampered by an infrastructure with often-impassable roads, it is effective, especially in the northern portion of the country where the influence of Islam is spreading. Many times, Christians in local areas are presenting the Gospel to their neighbors. This has helped the volunteering Christians gain confidence in their abilities and faith. It also adds to a large base of volunteers. Diversity in language is another reason why the door-to-door approach is most effective. Often called "Africa in miniature," there are 24 major African language groups in Cameroon, including more than 300 individual languages and the two official languages of English and French. A network of Christian volunteers is needed to reach many parts of the country. Visiting people in prisons, and hospitals conducting Bible studies and prayer meeting sessions, visiting people in their homes, conducting training, and encouraging church members to be Christ's witnesses in their places of work are the types of ministry that work well in Cameroon today. This interaction encourages the distribution of booklets and other printed materials. The current multicultural and linguistic makeup of the country is an asset for evangelism throughout Cameroon. LHM's staff members and volunteers can use their knowledge of other people's languages and cultures to present them with the Good News of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ in a culturally appropriate way.

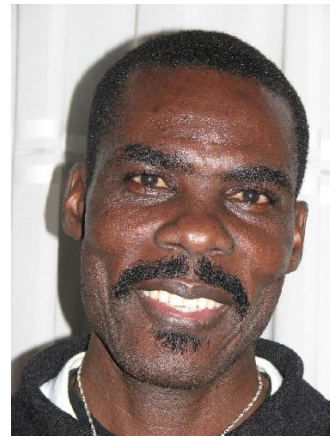
